Tulalip Tribal Police Patrol Narcotics Arrests and Seizure

On April 10, 2024, Tulalip Police Patrol night shift Officers contacted a suspicious vehicle. The investigation revealed the female driver had *2,923* Fentanyl pills, 20 Vicodin, 3.73 grams meth, and 6.33 grams of fentanyl. She was later booked into the County for Possession of Controlled Substances with Intent to Deliver. An occupant of the vehicle admitted to more narcotics being located inside of the vehicle. The officers applied for a Superior Court Search Warrant and executed the warrant for the suspected narcotics inside the vehicle. The total amount of narcotics recovered in this Patrol investigation was:

- 4,249 "M30" Fentanyl Pills
- 38.87grams Methamphetamine
- 33 grams Fentanyl Powder
- 90.87grams Purple Fentanyl
- 27.87grams Cocaine
- 20 Vicodin



This and the many other investigations conducted by our uniformed Patrol Officers demonstrates the commitment to addressing the Fentanyl epidemic using all resources of the department. "DEA Laboratory Testing Reveals that 6 out of 10 Fentanyl-Laced Fake Prescription Pills Now Contain a Potentially Lethal Dose of Fentanyl | DEA.gov." The readily available supply of Fentanyl laced pills does not make them any less deadly.
